MORAL TURPITUDE

"Moral turpitude" is a legal concept in the United States and some other countries that refers to "conduct that is considered contrary to community standards of justice, honesty, or good morals." The term appeared in United States immigration law beginning in the 19th century.

There is no universal list of which crimes constitute "crimes of moral turpitude" and which do not. Courts have decided this on a case-by-case basis. Crimes involving moral turpitude are not limited to the ones listed below.

Crimes Against the Person Found to Involve Moral Turpitude:

Murder or intentional homicide Stalking (aggravated)
Manslaughter (depends on degree) Indecent exposure

Involuntary manslaughter Assault (depends on degree)

Kidnapping Assault / aggravated assault by a male on a female

Aggravated battery Aggravated assault against a peace officer

Terrorism Driving while intoxicated (felony)
Voluntary manslaughter Failure to stop and render aid (FSRA)

Homicide by reckless conduct False report to a police officer / Lying to a police officer

Attempted murder Interfering with a law enforcement officer

Rape / sexual assault

Crimes Against Property Found to Involve Moral Turpitude:

Arson Extortion Blackmail Theft

Forgery Transporting stolen property

Robbery and attempted robbery Malicious trespass

Embezzlement Larceny

Burglary Possession of stolen property

Sexual and Family Crimes Found to Involve Moral Turpitude:

Assault (depends on degree) Sexual assault / Indecent assault (adult or child)

Adultery Bigamy
Spousal abuse Prostitution

Sodomy Disorderly conduct (case-by-case basis)

Child abuse Incest

Statutory rape and rape

Abandonment of a child

Purchase of a child

Crimes Against the Authority of Government Found to Involve Moral Turpitude:

Any charge of class B or above will be assessed on a case-by-case basis

The items listed above are used as guidelines based on United States of America case law.
